If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The College has a comprehensive Management Information which offers a wholesome picture on the performance of the college which offers staff and other stakeholders the chance for fine introspection and assessment of work done. The output of the institution is collated in 8 criteria matching the evaluation criteria of NAAC, NIRF, AISHE etc. so to enable the institution to effectively showcase its achievements for the accreditation experts and for other interested players. The modules are: Department, Teaching, Activities, Achievements, Infrastructure, Student Progression, Student Support and Report in addition to a Dashboard that offers graphical representation of these criteria. The modules are further divided to include detailed data entry, management, retrieval and evaluation. The Principal, Manager, IQAC Coordinator, HoDs, Teaching and support staff, coordinators of different cells and forums are given variant access to the criteria for data entry and assessment. The system is managed by deQ under IPSR Solutions that manages data for KSHE and other prestigious regulatory bodies. This management information system has further increased the efficiency of data processing in the institution and often serves as an internal auditing tool for the different stakeholders to measure their progress and improve in areas that need more attention. The dashboard which showcases individual progress and compares it to colleagues and other departments, accessible only to

students individual account holders to protect privacy, encourages all involved to work on their different criteria and match up to their colleagues. The system also help to track and store institutional data safely and to retrieve it when necessary avoiding duplication of documents and improving ease of doing work in the institution. Prompt monitoring the progress of different departments help the IQAC Coordinator and the Principal to encourage the different departments to bring out the best in them and to remind them to do better where needed.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Since its establishment in 1947, the Sree Kerala Varma College has been committed to imparting value-based education of highest quality with a vision to promote employability, innovative practices and research. Affiliated to the University of Calicut, the curriculum is set by the university. What we strive to do within this preset framework, is practice effective and punctilious curriculum delivery which takes into account the diverse needs of all our students. The University of Calicut adopted the semester system for Under Graduate courses in 2009. All reforms to the pattern of the Choice Based Credit Semester System (CBCSS) have been timely implemented since then. Many teachers of our institution play important decisive roles in the formulation and implementation of the syllabi in their capacities as members of the undergraduate and post graduate board of studies and university syndicate and senate in different subjects of Humanities, Social Sciences and Sciences. The academic calendar of the college, which is compliant with the academic calendar of the University of Calicut provides the framework for effective curriculum delivery. Additionally, each department also has a separate academic calendar, which schedules PTA meetings, internal examinations, annual/semester-wise programmes of the departments and field visits or study tours. Copies of the syllabus and timetables are made available to all students at the start of each semester. Portions are allotted to the teachers according to their area of expertise before the commencement of every semester after a detailed discussion of the syllabus in departmental meetings. Each teacher is directed to envisage a work plan that is in tandem with the changing academic atmosphere. Teachers are encouraged to equip themselves with online teaching tools and blended learning methods for constant up gradation and effective dissemination of knowledge. Invited lectures and cluster programs by distinguished scholars and eminent academicians streamline the students toward higher studies. All stipulations of the semester system-regular conduct of internal examinations, submission of assignments, the conduct of viva and seminar- are followed and implemented effectively. Remedial coaching is extended to slow and weak learners, and meritorious students are given institutional support through programs like Walk With a Scholar, Scholar Support Programme and Additional Skills Acquisition Program. Teachers are encouraged to adopt student-centered

teaching practices in their classrooms and amenities are made available with a vision to develop learner autonomy. Tutoring system makes sure that student needs, matters of student attendance, and progress of syllabus coverage. The IQAC of the college collects periodical feedback is obtained from the students, parents, and local community on aspects of teaching-learning.

Feedback Obtained Feedback from all the different stakeholders is essential for the proper evaluation and upliftment of any organization. For the purpose feedback forms are generated putting emphasis on the different service oriented areas of interest for different stakeholders. The feedback from learners, teachers,										

interest for different stakeholders. The feedback from learners, teachers, parents, alumni, local community and friends of the college was collected to chalk out a developmental future plan for the institution. It helped identify the different problem areas that were stumbling blocks to the institutions forward path. Regular department meetings are held to discuss and develop action plans to address the concerns raised in the students' feedback. For students' feedback a questionnaire has been designed covering all the segments of the college into five broad categories like, Teaching and Learning, Administrative office, Library, Sports and Extracurricular Activities and overall matters to collect the feedback on the above mentioned fields and to identify the strengths and weaknesses. The suggestions and feedback of the stakeholders are considered for framing our infrastructure policies. The major sources of findings are UGC, PTA and the Management. The IQAC collects regular feedback, both structured and otherwise from all stakeholders of the college. The inputs by the students, teachers, nonteaching staff, alumni and other wellwishers of the college are analyzed to identify the strengths and weaknesses of the institution and to plan out the future course of action to be adopted and the changes to be made in the current mode of functioning. This has proven to be very effective in terms of enhanced quality assurance and has opened up new courses of future action for the institution's progress.

(maximum 500 words) Sree Kerala Varma College has an effective mentoring system for its students provided by the faculty of the college. For the improved functioning of the program, the number of students allotted for a tutor has been 								

changed from 15 to 5 students. In addition to that, more focused mentoring of students are facilitated through WWs that supports exemplary students with focused mentoring and SSP that caters to the special needs of the struggling studnts. Mentors meet their students and guide them with their studies and extracurricular activities. They also provide advice relating to selection of majors, career guidance and personal problems. The learner demographic of Sree Keralavarma College is rural based and most of them come from very poor families, numerous number of them from single parent homes and many of them are first generation learners. They require a ready modulation in excess with their academic guidance. So every student is brought into mentoring system. More emphasis is given to the students with any subject and each student is assigned to the academic guidance of a particular teacher of his/her department. The mentors share ideas, communicate knowledge, and provide intervention with respect to academic and personal problems that the students seek help for so as to boost confidence of the students and to ensure that they are able to realize their varied potential most effectively. Students' mentoring is done in groups and on individual basis on a prescheduled day and also at the request of the learners. The group sessions help enhance the learner confidence and challenges them by setting higher goals, taking risks and ultimately guiding them to achieve higher levels, encourage psychosocial support at the time of need. Students get an exposure to diverse academic and professional perspectives, and experiences in various fields .Individual sessions help them tend to their specific problems and challenges and gives them a

safe space to seek help and support when required. The ongoing relationship and mentoring is nurtured through phone calls, email contacts and social media groups. The mentors also keep in touch with the parents to inform them about the academic performance of the students and to ensure that the student is offered healthy support

from their homes and a conducive learning atmosphere. It helps to develop a mutual bond. Mentors communicate with fellow faculty and promote mentees at the time of difficulty / opportunity to help them develop further in their areas of interest. The institution preserves the records of final mark of each mentee and discusses with the students about their result for future improvement and intimates HOD and Principal and suggests if any administrative action is called for. The mentor maintains detailed progressive records and keeps reports of all discussion with students. Grievance Redressal Cell is there for listening and execution of complaints of students.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The University of Calicut has adopted a Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) for PG and UG Programmes in all affiliated colleges. According to the system, internal marks for each semester amounts to 20 of the total aggregate score for each subject. Of the 20, 50 weight is for internal examinations, 25 for attendance in each semester and 25 for assignments, viva or seminars. During the admission process itself, evaluation methods are communicated to the students and parents by way of prospectus, notices and departmental meetings. Attendance registers are maintained for all courses separately. Internal assessment in college is transparent and Result Analysis is done by the class

tutors and pass percentage and performance of the students is monitored by the Principal and the necessary feedback is given to the concerned faculty members.

Remedial Classes are conducted for the slow learners, absentees and the students who participate in Sports, NSS activities and Placement Interviews. Sree Kerala Varma College accommodates a sizeable number of students who are differently abled. Such students are flexible option for evaluation mode that they are most comfortable with, viz. seminar or viva. External examinations of three hours duration, projects and dissertation are guided by mentors assigned and evaluated externally. Students should satisfy the eligibility criteria of

75 attendance in each semester to appear for University Examination. The verified marks are uploaded to the University website within the stipulated time after the three tier verification at the Tutor, HOD and Principal levels respectively.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The College is affiliated to the University of Calicut and adheres to the guidelines and framework set down by the University. The College Council comprising of the Principal, HoDs, and the Office Superintendent finalises the Academic Calendar of the College, in consultation with the Coordinators of important cells. The Academic Calendar incorporates holidays, teaching days, admission timeline, internal assessment schedule, seminar/workshop slots, sporting events etc. The calendar is prepared in beginning of the academic year and is adhered to unless in cases of emergency. The calendar is disseminated between staff and students and is displayed in the departments and on the college notice board. The academic calendar is pivotal in keeping the teaching learning process in track. It also imparts a sense of accountability to all concerned, as it makes it easier for them to check themselves periodically and make up any failure to adhere to it on a later date. Each department prepares an academic calendar in house incorporating intra departmental events, PTA meetings, department meetings and other programmes. In case of unwarranted and unforeseen holidays on account of hartals or natural calamities, special classes are scheduled and engaged prior or after scheduled working hours and / or on weekends to avoid any anomalies in work load and class engagement. Any deficiency in meeting the scheduled working hours daily, on account of leave or retirement of the teaching faculty, the work is shared by the existing faculty by appending a special timetable to the existing department timetable.

atmosphere, the college has added new labs, classrooms with ICT,LCD and other learning equipment and proper connectivity with wifi and LAN of optimal bandwidth. A well-stocked and upgraded library with Book Magic Management System, ebook repositories and e-journal data base access caters to the research interest of the students. A total of 44075000 is spent on the upkeep and upgrade of the library facilities. The college added to the access to computer systems with 144 computers for student access in addition to the 33 computer labs, 58 internet connections, 15 computer centres and 11 browsing facilities with a bandwidth of 250 or more. We have an automated office management system with computerised office and 17 departments. The institution has spent 18 lakhs on academic facilities and 16.5 lakhs on maintenance. The college spent 27 lakhs on spent enhancing the physical facilities of the college to ensure a finer bunch of amenities for the students. Another 23.5 was spent on the maintenance of the existing physical facilities. Our institution has one of the best Physical Education Department in Kerala and has produced many international and national athletes, who were also placed in comfortable positions in various government/ semi- government institutions. Apart from the funding from college, an active sports alumni and the support of the college alumni is what keeps the show running with much aplomb, the college stadium which was upgraded with the support of the alumni and many playing teams sponsored by our alumni are ample proof to this support system. It is the practice regular maintenance and upgrade that has kept our institution founded a few days before the Indian Independence to march through the years to provide quality education to thousands of students every year.

The two University Union Councillors represent the college at the University level. One faculty is nominated by the College Council as staff advisor to guide the activities of

the Students' Council. The College Union mainly works towards the growth of the academic, cultural, literary and political sensibility and skillset of the students and conducts programmes throughout the year. As an institution that welcomes a comparatively higher number of students from socially challenged backgrounds, we also take inputs from students on framing the fee structure and in offering free-ships to students. The students also have a say in the facilitation of student amenities and support systems like Bridge courses, Career Counselling, Orientation Sessions for Competitive Exams and higher studies, training Sessions on Performative Art, Creative Writing, Language lab facilities, Industry Visits, Yoga, Meditation, Soft skill development classes, Remedial coaching, Personal Counselling and Mentoring and other enrichment facilities. Our grievance redressal cell, Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell and Internal Complaints Committee has student representatives while the Equal Opportunity Cell functions along students incorporating their input and feedback. The activities of the College Union also include Annual College Day celebrations and organising and conducting numerous programmes including film festivals, drama festivals, book fairs, seminars and talks on relevant issues, awareness drives etc. They are also involved in selecting and training talented students for intercollegiate competitions and events. The college has adopted a new information management system for Office Automation that gives individual departments freedom to handle the entry, management and processing of staff and student dat, and paperwork without physically visiting the office and without the intervention of multiple office staff. This newly adopted system provides reduces paper clutter and the difficulty in locating and refiling of individual files and eliminates duplication of existing files enhancing ease of doing business for the office as well. This has contributing to avoiding data conflicts and towards a healthier working environment in the institution. Another initiative was done in terms of academic performance improvement. The PTA also helped with the proper repair of the classrooms affected by the heavy downpour that affected Kerala this year. PTA also sponsored academic seminars in various seminars to introduce learners to new knowledge and to encourage their research interests.

The annual college staff tour which is a staff outing for teaching and support staff helps in maintaining a good rapport between the staff members and contributes to their working together for the well being of the college.

Every new year, the college identifies projects of academic and infrastructural development for the betterment of the campus eco-system: The College understands that along with the new generation courses, it is important to preserved support traditional course for a well-balanced academic culture. The college has started the process for a new PG Course in Hindi Language and Literature with this vision. The need for new research departments and improved facilities for existing research departments were identified and the process for actyalising them was initiated. The floods in two consecutive years have badly affected the eco system of our green conscious campus and have made us increasingly aware of the need to preserve the greenery and the fresh water resources of the college. The centuries old fresh water pond near the ladies hostel, and two old wells in the college were swept, raked and cleaned mulch and wild plant growth removed, and protective measures were taken for the regular maintenance of the same. A survey for identifying and repairing the damage suffered to the natural orchard inside the campus, affectionately nicknamed, "Ooty", boasting of rare flora and fauna, was also started.

being environmental conscious in a world looming under the threat of global warming is a contribution in itself to the larger society. Even though we have adopted familiar practices like moving from tradition bulbs to LED lighting and similar conservation methods, SKVC has something distinct to add to the notion of eco-friendly campus. Unlike many other campuses of the district, our campus has more tress than classrooms. We cancel out the carbon footprint by planting more trees every year inside the campus and most significantly by ensuring the preservation of the natural orchard within the campus, nicknamed "Ooty". The orchard is resplendent with rare flora and fauna and houses many small animals and birds. One of the greatest and most famous student movement in the college was for the preservation of the orchard when an earlier management tried to cut down the trees for sale. The orchard is pivotal in reducing the CO2 emissions of the locality and keeps the temperature cooler in the locality. It also help to maintain a high level of ground water in the community around the campus. The college has rainwater lanes running through the campus which ensures that the rain pouring inside the campus is rerouted to replenish the two fresh water ponds inside the orchard creating surplus water even after the use of about 3000 individuals of the institution. In a growing culture of razing trees to the ground in the name of beautification, flower gardens and token farming it is the commitment to keeping the habitat of many creatures intact and in preserving the flora and fauna while contributing to a greener locality that SKVC remains distinct in its sustainability initiatives.

Harvesting rain water inside the campus using traditional rain water paths through out the campus and channeling and maintaining them every rainy season to ensure that the water is rerouted to the fresh water resources or to seep into the ground. The huge windows in our classrooms have helped air circulation and in keeping the use of fans minimum inside the classrooms. S0, we ensure that all new construction has multiple and huge windows and ample air circulation to let in as much natural light and natural circulation of air for lesser consumption of electricity and better health of the staff and students. The campus is plastic free and encourages staff and students to use less plastic and to switch to more eco-friendly alternatives in their personal spaces as well. All the departments reuse one-sided printed paper for in-house communication and the communication mode . Students too are encouraged to follow suit. It is also this year that the institution shifted away from traditional power consuming lightings to using LED lighting solutions.

This is a tradition that has been the pride of the campus for more than a decade which is continuing exclusively thanks to the humanitarian spirit and good will of the students. This initiative instils social commitment and the willingness to reach out in the participating students and makes them better social beings. 2. Blood Donation is through various donation drives are not uncommon in educational institutions. Blood donation helps the donor to help save a fellow life while losing nothing as blood is replenished easily, especially in young adults. But the importance of blood donation is yet to be adopted widely and many a patient is made to undergo the additional toil of finding a suitable donor while coping with the preparations for going under the knife. SKVC too runs blood donation drives periodically with the support of student union, NSS, NCC etc. SKVC has another tradition that has been successfully running for years blood donation through out the year. With numerous hospitals nearby, the students of SKVC had witnessed many a helpless patient or companion in dire search of matching blood donors. Realising the need to rise to the rescue of fellow human being and to reach out to the society, the college union decided to reach out to such patients by creating a pool of potential blood donors and has cultivated a habit of blood donation in fellow students that no patient in the nearby hospitals have one less thing to worry about. More than 250 students donate blood every year, in addition to the participation in blood donation drives. Be it the gift of food or the gift of blood, both are gifts of live. SKVC is blessed to have found two best practices, both born from the social commitment of its students, that can change the life of a fellow human through small acts of kindness.

8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

The year was one of many opportunities and challenges with the threat of the Covid-19 pandemic that changed the approach towards learning and the functioning of higher education institutions. In light of the pandemic that demanded alternatives for face to face learning and called for a heightened sanitization and preventive measures, the IQAC had a busy and rewarding year preparing the institution for these opportunities and challenges through problem solving and facilitation. The first challenge was to enquire and help implement blended learning and evaluation methods as learning happened mostly through online mode. An eclectic method had to be envisioned and materialized that was suitable for different streams and was inclusive of learners from regionally as well as economically marginalized learners with less connectivity and lesser access to digital resources were an additional challenge. The IQAC suggested different online platforms and flexible learning hours to maximize learner participation. Learning devices were distributed to economically challenged learners by the respective teaching departments and student collectives to ensure access to all. IQAC embarked on the initiative to prepare the educators and learners for the changed and blended learning method. IQAC and other departments conducted online seminars, conferences, and training programs for learners from the host and outside institutions. The need to equip educators with e-learning tools was the need of the moment and the faculty responded to by enrolling themselves in various enrichment programs. As the lockdown was gradually lifted, the college needed to ensure its safe functioning without the risk of a pandemic outbreak. Sanitizers and washing stations were installed at all entrances and classrooms a seminar on Covid-19 risks and preventive measures was conducted to make sure that informed prevention is possible. The local community was sensitized on the pandemic and the in-house production of sanitizers helped distribute then to economically challenged homes. Daily sanitization of classrooms and common areas were also ensured with cleaning supplements produced in-house with the help of the Department of Chemistry. The pandemic offered another opportunity to teachers to enhance their professional skills as IQAC encouraged the faculty to use the time saved on commute to enroll in national and international enrichment programs with special emphasis on online and blended learning as well as subject expertise. This endeavor was to make sure that the institution is ready for a changed educational scenario were blended learning becomes the norm. The year marked a shift in the way that IQAC functioned within the campus as it had to equip the institution and its stakeholders for a changing educational scenario. With ample inputs from learners, teachers and local community, the IQAC was able to facilitate and function as a problem solving agency toward a healthy and inclusive learning atmosphere.
